Chinook Jargon words have been used extensively in the Northwest for naming topographic features as weil as a n:xmber of towns and counties. Such words are so common on National Forest maps that we believe a translation of then will ce of interest to Forest officers and to others who use the maps. A number of Chinook Jargon dictionaries have been written, but these do not always agree. As one writer states: "The jargon is essentially a spoken and not a written tongue. There are no hard and fast rules for the spelling of words."
"The Chinook Jargon and How to Use It" by George C. Shaw covers the subject probably as well, if not better, than any other publication, and the following translations have been taken from it.

In some words decisions of the U. S. Geographic Board have disagreed with Sham. In such cases the U. S. Geographic Board spelling follows Sham's word in parenthesis. There are also some post Offices whose nanes are spelled differently. These also are shown in parenthesis in the following lists:
